Rolling up our sleeves.

34 First Nations have sent their BCRs to the Fraser Salmon Management Council.

This year's salmon fishing season has been a busy and productive one. Almost all other business goes into a holding pattern while this hugely important activity takes place throughout the summer and into the early fall.

But there is now some very important work to be done over the next two months in order to bring the **Fraser Salmon Management Council (FSMC)** into operation.

Last March the Constitution and Bylaws of the FSMC were approved by the representatives of the Signatory First Nations. The next step was for those representatives to return to their communities and obtain approval, through a Band Council Resolution (BCR), for moving ahead with the FSMC. To date, 34 First Nations have emailed us their BCR (full list on page 2).

Pat Matthew, Chair of the Main Table, recently sent letters to all those who have yet to complete the BCR process, asking them to put this before their Councils as soon as possible.

Main Table representatives will follow up with First Nations, offering to attend meetings and to answer questions about the FSMC. On October 6th, Pat will meet with the Council of Ha'wiih.

November 10, 2014 is the target date for receipt of BCRs. This will enable representatives (now referred to in the Bylaws as "Member Delegates") to hold an Assembly in late November.

At that Assembly delegates will "operationalize" the FSMC – i.e. appoint a Board of Directors, review draft policies, and appoint working committees to begin preparing for negotiating a Fraser salmon management agreement with DFO starting next spring.

Our thanks to those who've sent in their BCRs. We look forward to working with everyone this fall.


