Fraser Salmon Update - By Neil Todd, FRAFS Operations Manager

Mike Staley held his weekly Thursday afternoon update teleconference call at 4 p.m. on August 25, 2011.

GENERAL:

Pink salmon catches in the outside test fisheries are now "overwhelming" the presence of sockeye. It is expected that the Mission hydroacoustic facility will cease operations very soon as the numbers of pink salmon, mixed with sockeye and chinook, result in species composition data becoming unreliable.

Regarding the sockeye that are being caught in the outside test fisheries, a very large majority are Late Run stocks, meaning that the Summer Run group migration into the river is drawing closer to an end. There was a brief period of time when the Salmon Commission was thinking that the Summer Run group might be as much as 2 million this year, but have since adjusted the in season estimate back down to the 1.5-1.6 million range (near forecast).

In-river test fishery catches (lower Fraser) are still made up of Summer Run stocks, and the Harrison sockeye, to a very large degree. This is considered to be an indication that good numbers of the Late Run stocks (Weaver/Late Shuswap) may be holding in the Gulf off the mouth of the Fraser – behavior that is typical of historical run timing that maximizes potential for in-river survival and survival to spawn.

Regarding the Late Run group, it is difficult to derive an inseason estimate but calculations from the outside test fishery indicate that the "true lates" (Weaver/Late Shuswap) numbers may be in the 700-900,000 range.


IN-SEASON RUN SIZE ESTIMATES:

- 1. The Early Summer Run in season run size estimate has been set at 480,000, which is above the pre-season forecast of 453,000. Most of the stocks in this group are now in or near the natal streams.
- 2. The Summer Run stock aggregate in season run size estimate is 1.6 million. Pre-season forecast was 1.5 million,
- 3. The Harrison stock has in past years been considered to be part of the Late Run sockeye group. However, their timing has been very distinctly similar to that of the Summer Run group this year so the Panel is now accounting for them separately. This stock has peaked and numbers are now dropping. The total return is expected to be in the 800-850,000 range, well over twice the pre-season forecast of 345,000. 4. The Late Run group (consists mostly of Weaver Cr. and Shuswap stocks) appears to be returning at or above the forecast of 638,000. Based on outside test fishery data, the modeling is suggesting a return of about 780,000.

ENVIRONMENT:

Temperatures in the Fraser River are remaining relatively cool and river discharge continues to drop, although it is still above normal for this time of year. Migration conditions for the Summer Run stocks are considered to be good, with no Management Adjustment needing to be factored in.

Early Stuart sockeye: spawning has just about finished, and the news is not good. The spawning number estimates have not yet been compiled but preliminary information is not encouraging. Spawning ground surveys have indicated that fish were scarce, and in most cases the regular sampling for sex ratios and female spawning success have not been able to be carried out.


